Becoming An Eagle Christian Part V

"Under God's Wing".

The parent eagle will spread its great wings out to cover its young in times of storm or danger.

- The eagle will relentlessly defend its young and nest against intruders.
- In times of great storms, the eagle will shield the nest and even give its life to protect the young.

There are many storms brewing around us every day:

- 60 countries currently at war or in armed conflict
- 459 separatists/militia groups involved
 - o Matt 24 Jesus said not to be alarmed when we see these things
- Closer to home
 - Violent crime continues to increase
 - o Cybercrime is escalating
 - Our government was shut down for over 2 weeks recently costing 24 billion

Psalm 91:1-4 - Whoever dwells in the shelter of the Most High will rest in the shadow of the Almighty; I will say of the LORD, "He is my refuge and my fortress, my God, in whom I trust." Surely he will save you from the fowler's snare and from the deadly pestilence. (4) He will cover you with his feathers, and under his wings you will find refuge; his faithfulness will be your shield and rampart.

Three thoughts (triad) given in this 4th verse:

1. The covering wing

- a. Author of Psalm 91 is unassigned although there are strong arguments for both David and Moses, the writer of the previous Psalm (90)
- b. Both men knew hardship and comfort; victory and defeat and were called to lead a nation
 - i. The tone of this verse is similar to what Moses wrote in Deut 32:11
 - ii. As an eagle stirs up its nest, Hovers over its young, Spreading out its wings, taking them up, Carrying them on its wings,
 - iii. Both would have been familiar with the text
 - Deut on her wing (KJV)
 - Psalms under the wing
- c. The covering (saw heck) also means to weave together
 - i. The covering is not partial
 - ii. It is not incomplete
 - iii. It is all around us it means to envelope

2. Under His wings you will find refuge

- a. There is a vivid picture of the urgency of our faith in Him and His love for us
 - i. Refuge means shelter or protection from danger

- ii. In the original language it means to take asylum
- iii. Cuban baseball players Renee Arocha 1991
- b. Many great hymns written about God's protective love
- c. Edward Mote c 1834

My hope is built on nothing less than Jesus' blood and righteousness; I dare not trust the sweetest frame, but wholly lean on Jesus' name. When darkness veils His lovely face, I rest on His unchanging grace; In every high and stormy gale My anchor holds within the veil.

On Christ, the solid Rock, I stand; All other ground is sinking sand.

3. His faithfulness will be our shield and our rampart

- a. This is a core aspect of the very nature of God revealed to us His faithfulness (sureness, continuance, truth)
- b. Why would a person seek a place of refuge without knowing if they will be safe?
- Psalms 89:8 Who is like you, LORD God Almighty? You, LORD, are mighty, and your faithfulness surrounds you. (Surrounds on all sides)
 - c. Rampart tall thick stone or dirt wall to protect an area from invasion wall of Jerusalem; wall of Jericho; Great Wall of China)
 - d. Shield Eph.6:16
 - i. Not the small fighting shield that protected the arm and allowed for penetration
 - ii. The large shield that will protect the whole body

The greatest battles we will face however are not in the natural but in the spiritual:

- The greatest ultimate loss of a physical battle is our natural life
- The greatest ultimate loss of a spiritual battle is our eternity

Back to the Eagle

- 1. The snake is one of the primary enemies of the young ground eagle.
- 2. The mother will present itself as a target to protect its young.
- 3. The eagle will cause the serpent to strike and miss exposing its head.
- 4. With lightning speed the eagle will strike and grasp the snake with its talons.
- 5. The snake will be taken to a rock or high tree where it will be passed along through the talons until the head is reached.
- 6. The eagle will decapitate the snake with its beak and return the body to the nest for the young to feed on.
- 7. If the snake is too large to remove the head the eagle will soar high into the air and drop the snake on a rock until it is dead

Warring with the Spiritual Snake

- 1. There are 4 different words used to describe the snake in the Bible
- 2. The head in the Scriptures represents power and authority.
- 3. By His life, death and crucifixion, Jesus removed Satan's head/authority

- a. Gen. 3:15 God states that the head of the serpent will be crushed
- b. I John 5:18 We know that anyone born of God does not continue to sin; the One who was born of God keeps them safe, and the evil one cannot harm them.
- 4. We too have the ability to be triumphant in our lives over the enemy through the power of the Holy Spirit.
 - a. Luke 10:19 I have given you authority to trample on snakes and scorpions and to overcome all the power of the enemy
 - b. Authority also means the right to; the right we have as children of God
- 5. Just as the eagle uses its beak to overpower the serpent, we too have our "beak" our mouth.
- 6. From our mouth comes the Word of God which is a sword. (Eph. 6:17)
- 7. Jesus defeated Satan in the desert with His mouth by speaking the Word.

The eagle provides us with a picture of how we should deal with the spiritual attacks of our lives –

- 1. First, use our "beak" to speak the Word of God and then...
- 2. Cast it on the "Rock" which is the Lord Jesus Christ.
 - a. Psalms 95:1 Come, let us sing for joy to the LORD; let us shout aloud to the Rock of our salvation.
 - b. Isa 36:4 Trust in the LORD forever, for the LORD, the LORD himself, is the Rock eternal.
- Vs. 3 His oath, His covenant, and blood; Support me in the whelming flood; When every earthly prop gives way, He then is all my Hope and Stay.
- 1. His love will cover and protect us every day but especially in the time of the storms
- 2. Trust Him and His faithfulness
- 3. Have no fear
 - a. Psalm 23:4 ...though I walk through the darkest valley I will fear no evil for you are with me
