Perception vs. Reality

Matthew 14:22-32

Recognizing and dealing with deception is an important first step in living in the last days. Now we need to take it to the next level - recognizing the difference between our perception and God's reality.

- 1. Perception (def) an awareness of the various elements of ones environment through physical senses.
- What impacts our perceptions?
- Part of what we struggle with today is that we are so overly-stimulated that we are not actually very aware of what is going on around us
 - We are, by in large, in a constant state of rushing from one thing to another
 - o People do multiple things trying to get tasks accomplished
 - Result is that little gets done well
- We are less and less aware of detail
 - o The test of looking at a picture with multiple images and then remembering
 - o It is why perceptions can be so faulty
- But perception is also up to the individual's perspective (Height of a person)
- 2. Perception can be, but is not always, reality
 - a. The problem is that too many think that it is
 - i. "Reality is what I perceive it to be." (Bumper sticker)
 - b. Mirages on a hot highway or in the desert
- 3. The Disciples and Peter had many encounters when they were with Jesus that brought their perception up against God's reality
 - a. **READ** Matthew 14:22-32
 - b. Setting of the scene
 - i. Sea of Galilee is the lowest fresh-water lake on earth and the largest fresh-water lake in Israel
 - ii. A storm on the Sea of Galilee The cooler air masses from the surrounding mountains collide with the warm air in the lake's basin.
 - iii. The most violent storms are caused by the fierce winds which blow off the Golan Heights from the east.
 - c. Fishermen of that time were very superstitious trying to explain the weather
 - d. It had been a very intense day for Jesus
 - i. He had just been told about His cousin's death (14:12)
 - ii. He had fed the 5000 and then sent the disciples out in the boat (14:13-22)
 - iii. They had been trying to navigate the relatively short distant (Bethsaida to Capernaum) for approximately 6 9 hours
- 4. Like us the Disciple's perception was based on their knowledge and experience

- 5. But Peter did manage to see it differently (14:28)
 - a. Peter's perception of his environment was for a brief moment brought under the authority of God's reality.
 - i. Jesus was not bound by the laws of physics
 - ii. He did not operate in fear (Account of Jesus asleep in the boat Mark 4:35-41)
 - b. When Peter became willing to step out of the boat he surrendered his perception over to God's reality.
 - i. That moment of faith changed Peter
 - ii. He stepped out of his own perception and into reality
 - c. What circumstances in your life are going to require that you step out of your perception and into God's reality?
 - d. Can this be daily life for you?
 - e. Satan cannot effect God's reality of truth but he can speak lies to us about our perceptions
 - i. Satan's lies of perception vs. God's reality of truth
 - 1. You are worthless God died for you and for me
 - 2. You can't step out and do things for God I can do anything through God because He gives me the strength
 - 3. You have sinned and should be ashamed Jesus paid the price for me and he washed me white as snow
 - 4. You will never change Jesus' presence changes everything around it
 - 5. You are not loved Jesus living inside of you, is love
 - f. The disciple's boat can represent many things to us today
 - i. Complacency
 - ii. Religion
 - iii. Unbelief
 - g. Step out of the boat and give your perception over to God's reality
