The Night Before Christmas

Galatians 3:26-4:7

Few written works revolving around Christmas are as the familiar as the poem *The Night Before Christmas*

- Credit for the writing of the poem is generally given to Clement Clark Moore
- Professor of Oriental and Greek Literature as well as Biblical Learning at the General Theological Seminary in NYC
- Born in 1779 just after the declaration for American independence
- First published the poem anonymously in 1823 under the title A Visit from St. Nicholas
- His descriptive writing was what, almost more than anything else, has given us the visual image of Santa Clause used today

Moore used the opening two lines of the poem to create the mood and set the scene for his tale

Twas the night before Christmas and all through the house, not a creature was stirring not even a mouse. The stockings were hung by the chimney with care, in hopes that St. Nicholas soon would be there...

The night before Christmas, according to these first two lines was...

- Quiet and peaceful
- The family is safe and warm in their beds
- Everyone is dreaming sweet and wonderful things
- Outside it was cold, brightly lit from the new-fallen snow, and the idyllic Christmas setting
- A Norman Rockwell painting

I think it would be somewhat difficult to use these same words about the world today just as it would have been a little over 2000 years ago

- What kind of a world was Jesus born into?
- 1. First, it was time when a curse infested the earth
 - a. When Adam and Eve chose rebellion over obedience to God, the Bible says God placed a curse on the earth Gen 3:17
 - b. All 3 participants in the rebellion suffered the consequences
 - i. The serpent (satan) was cursed above all animals doomed to slither on the ground from that moment on
 - ii. For Eve childbearing become a painful and difficult ordeal
 - iii. And for Adam the ground beneath him was now cursed so that to get anything done required struggle and great effort even to survive
 - c. The curse of sin on the earth brought suffering, difficulties, trouble, pain, conflict, and eventually death to all living things.

- d. It was that way on that evening in Bethlehem and those struggles continue to this day
- e. On the first 'night before Christmas' a curse infested the earth

2. Second, Heaven was silent

- a. What does that mean?
- b. Throughout the history of man, prophets came and lived and brought the word of God from heaven
- c. Elijah, Elisha, Jonah, Amos, Hosea, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Obadiah, Daniel, Zechariah, and Malachi
 - i. With the writing of the last OT prophet's words found in Malachi 4:6, there was silence
 - ii. And for 400 years God did not speak to the people
 - iii. Within those 4 centuries, people still came to the temples and synagogues, but there was no new revelation
- d. The heavens remained silent until an angel appeared first to the priest Zechariah, then to Mary and then some shepherds and finally to the Maji
- e. But the night before Jesus was born there was nothing being spoken from heaven

3. Third, men were looking for a savior

- a. Back in the garden when Adam and Eve sinned God punished them but that was not the only thing He did
- b. You see, in God's holiness He had to deal with the sin
- c. But it did not change His love for us (like parents punishing their children) John 3:16
 - i. He also gave a promise (Gen 3:15)
 - ii. One that the prophets would repeat to the nation of Israel time and time again
- d. And because of the words of the prophets, man had been looking in different ways and with different motives
 - i. Some were selfish
 - ii. Some wanted revenge hoping for a military leader
 - iii. Others were sincere in recognizing what God was going to do
- e. All they knew was there there was a Savior redeemer coming!
 - 1. God would not leave His creation under the curse
 - 2. Sin and death would not win!
 - ii. And because of that promise, He would restore our relationship to Himself through His Son, Jesus Christ our Savior

4. The clock in heaven was ticking

- a. **READ** Gal 3:26-4:7
- b. Verse 4 ...when the time had fully come...
- c. More commonly read as ... in the fullness of time... means when everything is ready
 - i. The question has been asked why did God not provide redemption at the time of the sin?

- ii. To ask that questions means then that we should also ask what delayed the art of printing language keeping man in great ignorance for so long?
- iii. What delayed the discoveries of medicine to cure diseases that killed millions of people?
- iv. What delayed any aspect of life that was for the comfort, intelligence, and salvation of man?
- d. Simply put, it was at God's perfect time that will remain unknown to us...

But consider this...

- i. It was the time following the OT prophecies that would be fulfilled by Jesus demonstrating providence and perfection of God
- ii. Note that Jesus came after a time of great effort to change the course of man from darkness to light
 - 1. Through great art and literature
 - 2. Specifically, the Greeks and the Romans who were looked on as the two great societies of the world
 - 3. But they failed, and man was sinking deeper into the pit of their own creation
- iii. It was a time when the world was in relative peace
 - 1. In the time of the Roman empire, Janus was a pagan Roman god of boundaries with two faces
 - 2. The temple of Janus was only closed in Rome during times of peace and remained open in times of war
 - 3. During times of peace, the boundaries between nations were much more open and available meaning communication was much easier
 - a. What better time in history for a new relationship with God to come into the world
 - b. The disciples and followers of Jesus would be able to move much more freely taking the message to the world
 - c. Because of this freedom, Greek (the language in which the original texts of the NT were written) was the most widely spoken language of the day
- iv. When God Himself, in His perfect wisdom, was ready...the time came

This was the world the day BEFORE Jesus was born but what happened that first night meant the world would never be the same again!

- A. Jesus' birth, life, and death put an end to the curse that had infested the earth
 - a. Oh, there is still sin present
 - b. The snake still slithers, childbirth is still difficult, and man must toil to survive in the world
 - c. But unlike the time before Jesus now there is an end in sight because the eternity of the curse in the garden has been lifted
 - d. Soon, all of God's creation will be returned to the splendor of God's perfection
- B. Jesus' arrival shattered the silence from heaven
 - a. Listen to the very first two verses written by the author of Hebrews

- b. Heb 1:1-2a God, who at various times and in various ways spoke in times past to the fathers by the prophets, has in these last days spoken to us by His Son, whom He has appointed heir of all things, through whom also He made the worlds;
- c. They had been watching for Jesus, listening for the voice of God for over 400 years and yet had seen and heard nothing
- d. The birth that first Christmas morning was a trumpet blast to all creation that the promise of God was being fulfilled!
- C. The birth of Jesus came at the perfect moment
 - a. Everything God does is perfect
 - b. From the time in history to the condition of the world events to make it easier for the news of His birth, life, and ministry to be spread
 - c. Likewise today, we must maintain and increase our faith in the timing of God
 - d. God is perfect and that includes the time when He sent His Son to be our Savior

Everything changed when Jesus was born!

- His birth made all things possible
- The downtrodden would receive good news
- The poor would be cared for
- The brokenhearted encouraged
- The captive set free
- The blind would see

But the low-key nature of His birth did not in any way diminish the world-altering power of what took place that first night, and it was an unknown poet who captures, I believe, the wonderous prospects of what that first night meant:

That night when in Judean skies; The great star dispensed its light,

A blind man moved in his sleep; And dreamed that he had sight.

That night when shepherds heard the song; Of hosts angelic choiring near. A deaf man stirred in slumber's spell; And dreamed that he could hear.

That night when o'er the new-born babe; The tender Mary rose to lean, A loathsome leper smiled in sleep; And dreamed that he was clean.

That night when in the manger lay; The Sanctified who came to save, A man moved in the sleep of death; And dreamed there was no grave.
